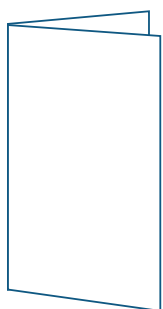
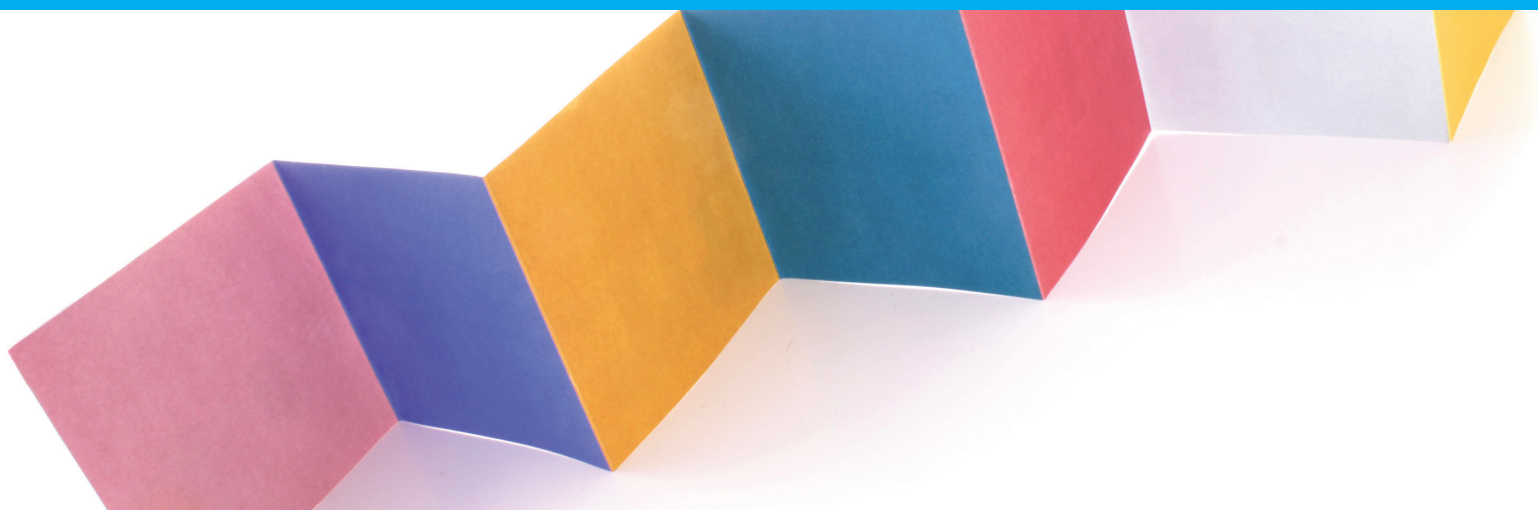


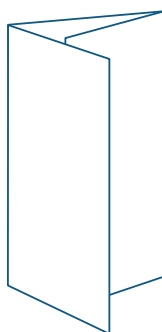
Common Folding Styles



Half Fold

all panels are the same size

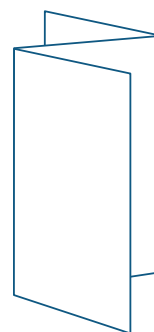
A half-fold is a sheet of paper folded in half. It's also sometimes called a 4-pager or 4-page brochure.



Tri/Letter Fold*

special sizing requirements

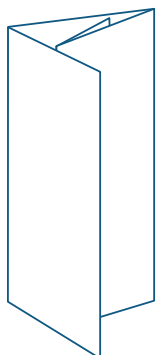
A tri-fold is a sheet of paper folded into three parts, creating six distinct panels.



Z-Fold

all panels are the same size

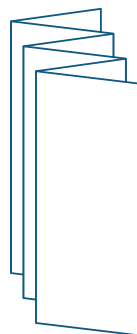
A z-fold features two parallel folds that create a fan-like structure with six equal panels.



Roll Fold*

special sizing requirements

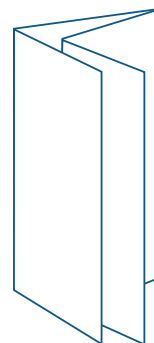
A roll fold, or barrel fold, is a sheet of paper folded inward 4 or more times in the same direction, with each panel tucking into the next.



Accordion Fold

all panels are the same size

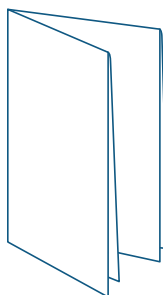
An accordion fold is a zigzag fold with 4 or more panels.



Double Parallel Fold

all panels are the same size

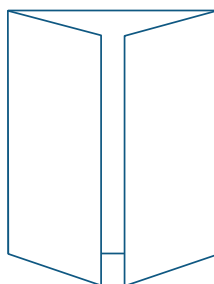
A double parallel fold is a sheet of paper folded horizontally in half, and then folded in half again.



Right Angle Fold

all panels are the same size

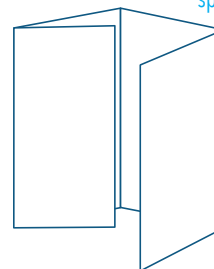
A right angle fold, or French fold, involves folding a sheet of paper in one direction (such as in half) and then folding it again at a 90-degree angle to the first fold.



Gate Fold*

special sizing requirements

A gate fold is where two outer panels fold inward to meet in the center, resembling opening doors.



Double Gate Fold*

special sizing requirements

A double gate fold is an 8-panel piece created by folding both ends of a large sheet inward (like saloon doors), and then folding the entire sheet in half.
